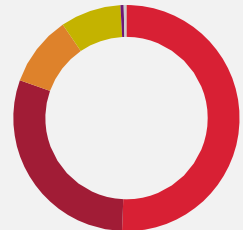

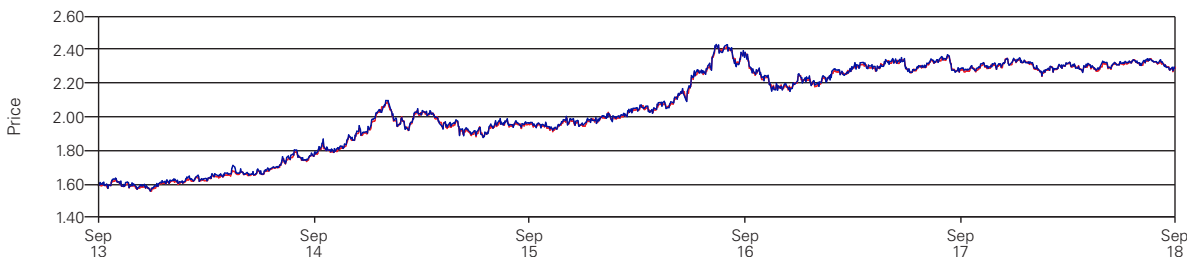

market commentary

UK bonds posted negative returns over the quarter with corporate bonds outperforming government bonds (Gilts) as investors shrugged off macro concerns including ongoing trade tensions, the prospect of tighter monetary policy and persistent emerging market pressures. Gilts yields rose in line with other core government bond yields, boosted by hopes of fiscal restraint in Italy, signs of a Brexit deal and higher US Treasury yields. Towards the end of the month however, hopes for a softer Brexit suffered a setback as there was no breakthrough in talks between the UK and EU. Corporate bonds also generated negative returns mainly due to higher Gilt yields even as credit spreads tightened. On the policy front, the Bank of England (BoE) raised interest rates for the second time in a decade to 0.75%.
