



## **future**focus

#### market commentary

Most global bonds generated negative returns in the first quarter, with corporate bonds underperforming government bonds. US government bonds posted losses as the yield curve edged higher, due to concerns around a widening twin deficit and higher inflation. Moreover, the US Federal Reserve raised interest rates in March, at its first meeting under new Chairman Jerome Powell. In Europe, German bunds generated positive returns after European Central Bank policymakers signalled that interest rates would remain low, supporting the view that the central bank would implement a gradual withdrawal of monetary stimulus. UK government bonds (Gilts) also rallied. The Bank of England kept interest rates on hold during the quarter, with an intense focus on the looming Brexit deadline and its potential impact on growth.

Pension conversion risk is the risk that the amount of income you can buy drops before you retire, because your money is invested differently to annuity funds. That's why putting more of your DC pension pot into bonds to try to match annuity prices as you get closer to retirement age can help protect against this risk.	Low
