#### market commentary

Fixed income markets posted positive returns over the quarter, with corporate bonds outperforming government bonds. Global government bond yields edged lower as risk appetite faded amid continued concerns about global growth and a worsening trade conflict between the US and China. Ten-year bond yields fell to record lows in Germany and France, and to below 2% in the US for the first time since 2016. UK government bond (Gilt) yields also fell, mirroring broader government bond markets and US Treasuries in particular. Meanwhile, the Bank of England kept interest rates unchanged at its June meeting, given the lack of clarity over the outcome of Brexit. In credit markets, corporate bond spreads tightened amid global central banks' rhetoric. Emerging market bonds also posted positive returns, as a fall in US Treasury yields supported hard currency bond returns.
